## Strategic Priorities Framework

PMNCH Board Meeting December 4, 2024





### PMNCH's Added Value

Respondents expressed strong support for PMNCH's mission, belief in its potential, and recognition of its unique role. They highlighted the following as key elements of its value:



**Inclusive membership model**: PMNCH's multi-constituency membership brings together diverse stakeholders across sectors, enabling bold advocacy, collaboration, and alignment on messaging and accountability.



**Holistic approach to WCAH**: PMNCH's comprehensive focus on the life course and continuum of care (CoC) for women, newborns, children, and adolescents frames WCAH advocacy issues holistically, advancing intersectional and sustainable solutions.



**Youth engagement in leadership**: Through the Adolescents and Youth Constituency (AYC), PMNCH prioritizes meaningful youth engagement in governance and decision-making. Initiatives like the What Young People Want Campaign and the 2023 Global Forum for Adolescents help bring youth priorities into PMNCH's core agenda.



**Global convening power**: PMNCH's ability to access high-level forums and engage influential leaders enhances its convening strength, with opportunities to make these engagements more politically impactful.



**Credibility and influence**: As a WHO-hosted partnership with UN agency and academic membership, PMNCH's advocacy messages and events are seen as having strong credibility and weight.



#### **SPOTLIGHT**

PMNCH's diverse membership and constituencies are its strength, enabling cross-sector convening power. However, many members remain disengaged, and engagement based on constituency rather than thematic or content-driven activities offers fewer opportunities for collaboration and impact.

To enhance value, PMNCH should focus on cross-constituency collaboration and action on thematic areas, knowledge-sharing, and agreed advocacy outcomes.

Clearer membership expectations, a unified advocacy voice, and measurable success metrics will strengthen alignment, deepen engagement, and amplify impact.

## **Key Recommendations**

Identify topline, concrete, trackable advocacy outcomes for WCAH and the 3 sub-themes

Priority outcomes to consider – agree on 4-5 per 2-year workplan:

- WCAH/life course: Advocate for full integration of essential WCAH
  interventions into UHC/PHC plans and budgets; increase domestic WCAH
  funding in focus countries; and sustain ODA for WCAH, prioritizing pooled
  financing for essential commodities and high-impact interventions.
- Maternal, newborn & child health: Urge the adoption of ambitious, measurable, evidence-based national plans aligned with the WHA77 resolution to reduce maternal, newborn, and child mortality in focus geographies; secure donor pledges for high-impact interventions and technologies.
- Sexual & reproductive health & rights: Ensure SRHR interventions are central to WCAH advocacy targets; counter anti-rights misinformation through a global platform to create protected political space for SRHR.
- Adolescent well-being: Include adolescent well-being within WCAH
  advocacy targets; and prioritize cross-cutting issues at the intersection
  of AWB, SRHR, and MNCH (addressing unintended pregnancies, HIV/STI
  prevention, and care for pregnant adolescents/first-time mothers).

# Align PMNCH workstreams and initiatives, geographically and functionally

To reduce silos and strengthen linkages across constituencies, thematic focus areas, and initiatives:

- Prioritize geographic alignment: Focus PMNCH initiatives (e.g., GLN, CAAP, DAH, parliamentary group engagement) on priority countries, with potential expansion as funding and capacity allow.
- Ensure thematic balance: Align efforts across WCAH and the three thematic areas, ensuring campaigns or activities centered on one area also highlight others to maintain stakeholder and donor engagement.
- Serve as an integrative platform for other issue-specific partnerships: Position PMNCH as a welcoming umbrella for vertical partnerships (e.g., FP2030, EWENE), fostering collaboration, shared workplans, and engagement with cross-cutting issues to jointly strengthen WCAH outcomes.
- Avoid over-specialization: Refrain from delving into specific subtopics within thematic areas for PMNCH-branded campaigns, focusing instead on amplifying the messages of members and allied vertical partnerships.

## **Key Recommendations**

### Situate accountability as central to effective advocacy

## Accountability is widely viewed as an essential but underdeveloped element of PMNCH's work. Options include:

- Adopt a mutual accountability model: Develop a WCAH scorecard with agreed indicators to track progress in PMNCH focus countries, convene high-level annual meetings (e.g., linked to the GLN) to review results, and engage donors, UN agencies, and civil society to recognize achievements, share lessons, and foster "friendly competition."
- Strengthen CAAP functionality in accountability and advocacy: Invest in capacity-building and tools development to support CAAP lead partners; encourage the inclusion of social accountability and citizen monitoring of health sector performance; utilize specialized partners to manage subgranting and capacity-building.
- Deepen engagement with parliamentarians: Partner with the IPU and/or other parliamentary groups to engage parliamentarian voices in accountability for government actions on WCAH and the three thematic areas.
- Monitor national progress: Collaborate with credible, qualified research and evidence organization to track and report on WCAH coverage and outcome indicators.

### Other key tactical options



During consultations with stakeholders, tactical and shorter-term suggestions emerged reflecting PMNCH's added value, including:

- Articulate a bold position on SRHR: PMNCH could publicize a strong stance supporting and defining SRHR to counter the anti-rights movement, offering "cover" for local organizations to speak out and responding to calls to be bold and provocative.
- Convene the community to define a unified WCAH platform post-US
  election: Leverage PMNCH's convening power to align partners on a shared
  WCAH position and action plan, responding to US election results and the
  evolving anti-rights landscape.
- Support G20 Call to Action on WCAH: Collaborate with the Government of South Africa to propose a G20 Call to Action, committing member states to eliminate preventable maternal and child deaths and promoting progressive WCAH policies.
- **Define post-2030 WCAH goals and targets:** Convene and lead the WCAH community in setting coordinated post-SDG goals and targets for WCAH and thematic priorities, ensuring alignment and leveraging PMNCH's strengths.
